Louisa May Alcott (1832–1888)




Louisa May Alcott (1832–1888), the author of *Little Women*, and her three sisters were born in Boston, a seaport and the capital of the American state of Massachusetts.

At the age of eight, she moved to nearby Concord with her family. There she spent the happiest years of her youth, even though she experienced the constant threat of poverty. The Alcotts had only a modest cottage, but the girls used a neighboring barn to perform plays that Louisa wrote.

She was educated at home and became a schoolteacher in Boston. Her first story was sold when she was twenty years old, and two years later her first full-length book was published. What pleased her the most about her writing, as she became more and more famous, was the sales of her books made her family's life more comfortable and less of a struggle. *Little Women*, published in 1869, has become one of America's classics.

About the story

Little Women is the story of the March family, a family that is used to hard work and suffering. Although Mr. March is away with the Union Army, the four sisters, Meg, Jo, Beth, and Amy and their mother keep their spirits high. Mrs. March is involved in local charity affairs, and under her influence, the girls always



generously offer their help to people in need.

At a big party during the Christmas season, the March sisters meet a young man named Laurie and have a wonderful time. Because of Mr. March's injury, the sisters must face the real challenge of being independent. Things get worse when Beth contracts scarlet fever and struggles with the illness.

With the strains of separation and reunion with loved ones, plus the adventure to the outside world pursuing their careers, the March sisters become mature, gain wisdom, and find the happiness through their family life.




