What pleased her the most about her writing, as she became more and more famous, was the sales of her books made her family's life more comfortable and less of a struggle. Laurie the Marches' neighbor, lives with his


grandfather, Mr. Laurence. Laurie is the only child in a wealthy family. He is

Amy amused⁵ her sisters further with her philosophical⁶ saying, "We'll all grow up someday. We might as well know what we want."




